Progress toward twin IBMP goals since GAO report

- 1. Transparency (e.g, information portal ibmp.info)
- 2. Operating under AM plan
- 3. Added tribal entities to the deliberative table
- 4. RTR lease/fencing on the north side to increase tolerance (public/private partnership)
- 5. Greatly increased numbers of bison on HB
- 6. Ongoing injection of science into the debate with persistence data, population data
- 7. Working toward vaccination as described in ROD
- 8. Strong efforts at creating Citizens Working Group
- 9. Meeting with landowners on the ground (X2)
- 10. No brucellosis transfer from bison to cattle
