# ESTABLISHMENT OF THE SITKALIDAK ISLAND BISON HERD

- Historical Harvesting
  - Ancestral Trade Routes
  - Dorrman, Bishop & Burton Bison Herds on Kodiak Island
- Need for Food Security
  - Access to Healthy Protein Source \$\$\$\$
  - · Reduction of food mile
  - Connection between food source and people
- Cultural Benefits
  - Connection between bison & our people
  - Cross Cultural Connections
- Economical Benefits
  - Hunting Guides, Transporters, Processing, Elders & Youth Programs
  - Sales from hunts & meat products





#### HERD HISTORY

- 1980 Bill Burton of Narrow Cape purchased 38 bison from Wyoming and shipped to AK via ferry
- 1990 Jim Van Oss of Homer purchase 10 bison (1bull/9cows) from Burtons and shipped via ferry
- 2000 Charlie Dorman purchased 50 bison from VanOss and transported them to Saltery Cove via barge
- 2017 Old Harbor Alliance purchased 43 bison from the Dorman family and relocated them to Sitkalidak Island via barge
- 2020 InterTribal Buffalo Council awarded the Alutiiq Tribe of Old Harbor 3 bulls from Yellowstone National Park. These were trucked, flown, and barged to Sitkalidak Island
- April 2022 Relocating 66 head from Narrow Cape to Sitkalidak Island



### BIOLOGICAL SAMPLE RESULTS

#### 35 Bison Sampled

- None of the animals tested have domestic cattle mitochondrial DNA
- 23/35 bison have low level of heterozygosity associated with inbreeding depression
- Low level of genetic diversity, not preferable for long term herd survival
- Need for integrating new animals for overall herd health established





#### GPS/VHF COLLARING PROJECT

- Resource Use
  - Comparison with 2016 Ecological Site Survey
  - Monitor Seasonal Use
  - Long-term Dietary Study
- Membership Educational Outreach
  - Youth Involvement
  - Outreach at Cultural Camps
  - Cultural Hunts & Meat Distribution
- Real Time Locations
  - Allow management to intervene if risk of going off island
  - Regular monitoring and assessment of predation risk to the herd.
- Monitor Individual Animals
  - · Health, Growth, & Wellbeing
